

A Letter From The President

Gentlemen.

Alpha Zeta Delta has been in a period of transition for several years now. The declining membership of the late 80's and early 90's led to the sale of the old Lodge several years ago. Since then, the Alpha has been transient, moving from one Lodge to another until we landed once again in a full-sized fraternity house in Champaign last year, settling in the former Alpha Chi Rho house on Armory Street.

This move marked a significant milestone in our journey back to prominence among fraternities at Illinois. However, we still have a long way to go. Membership peaked briefly this spring prior to graduation, but occupancy at the Lodge will remain at minimal levels again for the upcoming year. This is not entirely surprising given that we only recently moved from a much smaller facility into a building

with a capacity approaching that of the old Lodge on 2nd Street.

Alpha Zeta Delta now faces a new challenge. We have an opportunity to make significant strides in membership and campus presence. It is not an opportunity that will not be easy to seize, but success rarely comes without equal or greater risk of failure. The past few years have seen average membership levels change very little, but over that time there has been significant turnover in membership. The Alpha boasts a healthy mix of experienced upperclassmen and enthusiastic new members.

Unlike last year, we are already settled in the current Lodge, so there is no move to distract us from the business of rush and sap our energy prematurely. A fledgling summer rush program leads into

an aggressive rush plan that, if executed well, poses enormous potential for success. Our location in the midst of fraternity row in Champaign will make it easier for us to make and keep contact with prospective members, and our presence in a stately fraternity house gives us better credibility as an equal to larger fraternities with whom we compete for members.

There are several ways that alumni can help the actives to capitalize on the opportunity which we face leading into the upcoming school year. First, a phone call (217-344-7407), e-mail (chipsi@uiuc.edu), or letter (311 E. Armory, Champaign, IL 61820) to the actives with a few words of solidarity and encouragement will go a long way towards keeping enthusiasm levels high. Second, recommendations of rush prospects from alumni provide both assistance and encouragement to the Brothers. Third, attendance at rush events and alumni events also provides both assistance and encourage-

ment.

It is a well-documented fact that the strongest Alphas are those which have the strongest alumni support. The Alumni Corporation provides direct support to the Alpha, but the greatest boost that an Alpha can get is direct one-on-one support from alumni in ways similar to those which I mentioned above. The presence of alumni at any event or even a simple letter or phone call generates enormous enthusiasm by showing the actives and pledges that they are not in this alone. People will always exceed their own expectations when they truly feel a part of something bigger than themselves.

The first alumni event of the new school year is the annual Chi Psi Reunion on September 26 at the Lodge in Champaign. The Illini will play Iowa in the home Big Ten opener, and there will be an opportunity to spend time with

the actives and other alumni at the Lodge both before and after the game. We have purchased a small block of tickets to the game. If you want tickets, please provide a check for the appropriate number of tickets when you return your annual dues.

Speaking of dues, it is time once again for alumni dues. As always, I promise to pass the hat only once each year, and I will keep my solicitation short. The Alumni Corporation needs your support to continue to operate in support of the Alpha each year. Dues are only \$35 (\$20 for alumni from 1994-98). Additional donations are always welcome. Also, if you wish to make a tax-deductible contribution to the Alpha Zeta Delta of Chi Psi Educational Foundation, please enclose a separate check for whatever amount you feel is appropriate. There, that

wasn't so hard, was it?

To close, let me once again urge you to call, e-mail, or write the Lodge with your support and encouragement. If you can, I also encourage you to make an effort to visit the Lodge during an event or any other time to meet the actives, see their home, and renew your bonds.

Doin' a Little Duty

Last December, I took part in the initiation of six new members to our brotherhood. It was my first fraternity activity in over two years, and it came largely due to the fact that Brother Schallmo, my roommate, was going. At some point in the six years since my initiation, I allowed my devotion to lapse, and my sense of connectedness to atrophy. I didn't choose it to happen; rather, it slid into my life slowly and quietly.

How did it happen? Why did it happen? Well, how does anything like that happen? One moment I felt like I was part of something greater, and the next, I was reflecting back on my college time as a period of "youthful indiscretions." (Thank you, Henry Hyde) It was a minute shifting of priorities, from then to now. I figured that, once I had few extra bucks together, I'd send it along to the Alumni Corporation, and, y'know, do my part. But there never was a few extra bucks, y'know?

Then I went to initiation, in a Lodge I didn't know, hosted by people I didn't know, but that didn't matter. Champaign had changed quite a bit, yes, but the wind still poured down from the South Farms, and Perkins still sold their bread bowl salad. There was no formal epiphany, no lightning strike to re-energize my lagging loyalty. In one moment, I wished I was someplace else, and in the next, no other place would suffice. I was glad I came.

There's a name for this: duty. Specifically Easter Duty. It's a doctrine of the Roman Catholic Church that I never quite understood until that moment. Every good Catholic is supposed to go to Mass every Sunday, where the sacrament of the Eucharist is performed. This is celebrated as a community. However, there are some

theoretical flaws in the practice. For one, the sacrament only has to be done once, really. At First Communion, the wellspring of eternal life opens up within the recipient, and nothing, not even death can stem it. But it begs the question: if the flow can't be stopped, then why go back to Mass, week after week?

As it turns out, that was a good question, and one the Church tried to answer as best it could. It came up with Easter Duty, a belief that to ensure the "eternal wellspring," the faithful needed to go to Mass once a year, on Easter.

To my adolescent mind, teetering on adulthood, it seemed like a lot of handwaving to ensure mandatory attendance. But on that day, sharing the experience with six gentlemen, now brothers, it all became clear. Duty, that yearly obligation, fixes in the mind of the participant a sense of belonging. It's a jolt of community, straight to the heart, to remind us of the greater good that can be found by being one voice, joined in chorus.

So what am I saying? Simple. If you're reading this newsletter, and wondering why you're reading this, if you think back on your experiences in college, and can't remember what it felt like, if your memories of brotherhood feel more like a phantom limb than the keystone of all that has happened since, then do something good for your soul. Make a trip down to where it started, and attend the initiation of a fellow brother. Above all, do your Duty.
