I know it has been some time since the last issue of the Parthenon landed in your inbox, and I want to take this opportunity to apologize for that. This past year has been tumultuous for me, both personally and professionally, and getting the newsletter out every few months is a significant time commitment that unfortunately took a back seat to running my law firm, my family, and my other Chi Psi responsibilities.

I do want to assure all of you that things are going very well down in Urbana, as you will read throughout this issue, and that important work is being done at the Alumni Corporation level to support the Alpha.

We initiated eleven new Brothers last semester, and Spring rush is already off to a fast start. Every bedroom in the new Lodge is full this year, and should be again next year.

The Lodge itself continues to serve as the perfect home for our Alpha. Neal Rushforth, M.D., ZΔ '03, in particular, has dedicated significant time and treasure to ensuring that the Lodge is furnished appropriately and maintained in great condition. We will be putting a

new roof on the Lodge this summer after a few leaks developed this past year, but that should be the last major expenditure needed for the foreseeable future.

So things are going well. And as I look back at the progress we have made as a Brotherhood since 2017, I could not be more proud. We have accomplished a great deal in a short amount of time. But one of the goals we set for ourselves when we launched the Restoring Excellence Capital Campaign continues to elude us, and that is generating excitement and attracting new Brothers to serve as alumni volunteers.

All successful Alphas in Chi Psi have one thing in common: a strong, informed, dedicated base of alumni to support the Alpha, provide stability, and maintain personal connections across generations. Becoming a Brother in Chi Psi is a lifetime commitment, and the Alphas who are able to sustain success are the ones with the most dedicated base of alumni volunteers.

I'll be blunt - we need your help. While I understand no one can dedicate themselves to the Lodge continuously throughout their adult life, everyone should be able to serve on the Board or on a committee for a couple years here and there, and everyone should be able to attend some social events or initiatives down at the Lodge. That's part of being a Chi Psi. But for about the past 25

years, the same group of 10-15 alumni have done nearly all of the work on the Alumni Board. This is simply not sustainable.

We need more of you to volunteer, and we need more of you to show up. One of the most rewarding aspects of being a Brother in Chi Psi is getting to know the new Brothers and mentoring them as they transition from high school into college, and then from college into their careers. I'm directing my comments primarily to our more recent alumni - those from the classes of 2010 and later. Our Alpha needs you.

I will be stepping down as president of the Alumni Corporation this Fall, and I'll be nominating Jeremy Doser, ZΔ '97, to take over as President. Brother Doser has served as Vice-President these past three years, and he will do an exceptional job. But soon it will be time for a new generation of Zeta Delta alumni to take over. Phase II of the Restoring Excellence Capital Campaign to Kick Into High Gear

Just about four years ago, the Zeta Delta Alumni Corporation made a deal with the undergraduate leaders of Alpha Zeta Delta. The deal was this: if the undergraduates could guarantee that they would commit themselves to restoring a culture of excellence within Zeta Delta, that the Alumni would commit themselves to securing a permanent Lodge for the Alpha to call home for the next one hundred years.

On May 30, 2019, the Alumni fulfilled their promise, closing on the deal to purchase the Delta Zeta sorority house to serve as the next permanent Chi Psi Lodge on the University of Illinois campus.

Although there remains a significant mortgage outstanding and the job of the Alumni is far from finished, it appears that the undergraduates have similarly fulfilled their promise.

The Fall semester began with all 26 bedrooms of the Lodge occupied with undergraduate Brothers.

On top of filling up the new Lodge, we are pleased to report that the undergraduates are an outstanding group of gentlemen. At this past year's Annual Convention at Alpha Xi Delta (Texas Tech University), Zeta Delta was recognized as a finalist for the Goodbody Award for the third consecutive year. The Goodbody Award is given to the Alpha that exhibits the highest degree of academic excellence in a given year. You may recall that Zeta Delta brought home the award last year, and we are extremely proud that the undergraduates were again named a finalist for the award this year.

Our work is not done, however. You may recall that the Restoring Excellence Capital Campaign was initially broken up into two phases: Phase I was focused on generating enough capital to fund the down payment, and Phase II was de-

signed to pay off as much of the mortgage as possible as well as to replenish our Educational Trust fund.

This next year and a half is going to be crucial to the future of our Alpha. The loan we obtained from First Financial Bank is set to mature on June 5, 2024, and there remains approximately \$720,000.00 outstanding. Although we were able to negotiate our current rate down from 5.75% to 5.00% last year before interest rates skyrocketed, we will probably not be so lucky when we re-finance next year. In order to ensure that

dimensional wall paintings. Will published several books. His artworks have been shown in galleries throughout New England, the southern United States and Chicago. His work is found in collections internationally and in Boston, New York, Chicago and Los Angeles.

Diana was Will's partner of over 50 years. They lived in Holliston, Massachusetts and maintained a cabin he built and a studio on 85 acres in the Blue Ridge Mountains of Virginia. He adored his daughter Maya and his three grandsons, Paul, Stephen (Sparky) and Curtis. Will died on July 17, 2020 and is buried at the Massachusetts National Cemetery in Bourne, MA.

The sculpture we will be unveiling was carved by Will and was selected and donated by Diana to be placed in our Lodge as a remembrance and tribute to him.

We could not be more thankful for the exuberance and generosity that our alumni have shown throughout the course of the Restoring Excellence Capital Campaign. As we laid out at the start of the campaign, Phase I was a sprint and Phase II was going to be a marathon. The fact that we were able to accomplish our Phase I goal and secure a mortgage for the new Lodge fills us with pride, as we hope it does all of you. But our job is far from finished, and the time is now for us all to dig deep and do a little more.

Robert Curtis Preble, Jr., X '44

Robert Curtis Preble Jr. X '44 the 102nd recipient of the Distinguished Service Award and the 22nd #7 of the Chi Psi, died peacefully on December 30, 2022, eleven days after his 100th birthday.

Bob was born on December 19, 1922 in Oak Park, Illinois. His family

and friends gathered on December 17th at the Annex at Fleet Landing, Atlantic Beach Florida and again on December 18th at the Atlantic Beach Country Club to celebrate Bob's 100th birthday. Sam Bessey, past #23 and now Chi Psi's Chief Advancement Officer, and I were among the guests. We presented Bob with a framed photo of the Zeta Delta Brothers gathered in the Preble Family Library and framed Resolutions from our Alpha Corporation and the National Fraternity recognizing his long service to Chi Psi. Bob is the first #7 to have lived to be 100 years of age. As the accompanying picture reflects, Bob had a wonderful time at the parties.

Alpha Zeta Delta was adopted by Bob after his beloved Alpha Chi at Amherst College went dormant. He joined the other Preble family members that were initiated at our Alpha. They are his Father Robert Sr. '1919., Uncle Kenneth Sr., 1925, Brother William, 1946, and Cousin Kenneth Jr., 1952. Bob generously established scholarship funds with the Chi Psi Educational Trust for Zeta Delta undergraduates and supported the effort to purchase our new Lodge at 710 West Ohio and directed that his Chi Psi memorabilia be donated to Chi Psi to be placed in Jeffries Hall and the Preble Library at our Lodge.



On Friday December 29th I received the dreaded call from Ms. Timmy Byrd, Bob's assistant who oversaw his care. She informed me that Bob passed away peacefully earlier in the afternoon that day. Timmie told me that Bob had a special love for Chi Psi and took enormous pride in talking about his beloved fraternity. I've lost a good friend and Brother and I am enormously grateful that we shared over 50 years of Brotherhood through Chi Psi.

He was also passionate about science and technology from an early age. Dan enjoyed cooking and trying new recipes and going to new restaurants. Anyone that knew Dan, knew how kind and loyal he was. He was also known for his sense of humor and his smile.

Dan is preceded in death by his mother, Lynn Pacer (Higgins). Dan is survived by his father, Tom Pacer; sister, Alison Walsh (Pacer); nephew, Henry Walsh; his grandmother, Lorraine Higgins and his dear cousins, aunts, and uncles.
